Master of Science in Applied Sociology



Program Description

With an emphasis on the acquisition of theoretical knowledge and social research skills, the Master of Science in Applied Sociology degree program is designed to prepare students for careers in policy analysis, program development and evaluation and quantitative and qualitative data analysis. Taught by internationally recognized faculty at the University of Texas at Dallas, the program equips students with advanced training in areas such as:

- Quantitative methodologies
- Social stratification
- Research design



- Program evaluation
- Applied regression
- Domestic social policy

Although Applied Sociology is a terminal master's degree program, graduates interested in doctoral research have been accepted to external sociology doctoral programs throughout the country. The program is open to full- and part-time students, with many classes offered in the late afternoon and evenings.

Application Deadlines and Requirements

Applicants to the Applied Sociology master's degree program should have:

- A baccalaureate degree or its equivalent from an accredited institution of higher education. There are no required prerequisite courses in sociology for the Applied Sociology program, although prior coursework in social theory, research methods, and social statistics is desirable.
- A grade point average (GPA) of 3.0 out of a 4.0 scale, although applications are reviewed holistically.
- Test Scores: A verbal score of 156 and a quantitative score of 152 on the GRE is advisable, but standardized test scores are only one of the factors taken into account in determining admissions.
- Transcripts: Applicants should submit transcripts from all postsecondary institutions that they have attended.
- Letters of Recommendation: Applicants must submit three letters of recommendation from individuals who can judge the candidate's potential for success in the master's degree program.
- Admissions Essay: Applicants must submit a one-page essay outlining personal background, education and professional objectives.
- International applicants must submit a TOEFL score of at least 80 on the internet-based test. Scores must be less than two years old. See the Graduate Catalog for additional information regarding English proficiency requirements for international applicants.

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
